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
About ASEAN Teacher's Boot Camp





The ASEAN Teachers' Boot Camp, with the theme "Media and Information Literacy: Building Resilience for the Futures of Learning," supports UNESCO's goal to ensure that all citizens have access to media and information competencies.

This project is a continuation of a previously successful **TechCamp Malaysia - Philippines 2021** project funded by the U.S. Department of State, U.S. Embassy Kuala Lumpur, and Penang Institute.





The Media and Information Literacy ASEAN Teachers' Boot Camp aims to train and deepen the understanding of the importance of media and information literacy in a fast-moving, digital media landscape among teachers and teacher educators in Cambodia, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, and Thailand.

Objectives

Specifically, the virtual Boot Camp aims to:

- Expand participants' knowledge and competencies on topics related to Media and Information Literacy (MIL) to enable them to integrate MIL across the curricula and develop the critical thinking capacity of students so that they can actively engage with different segments of society.
- Build a network with other Southeast Asian teachers and teacher educators for future collaboration and knowledge, as well as classroom experience sharing in teaching/integrating MIL across the curricula.




Eligibility Requirements

Applicants are selected based on:

- Educational background and qualification;
- Prior work and teaching experience;
- Leadership skills Interests in Education / Teacher Education / Education Reform and Education Transformation / Media and Information Literacy / Digital or ICT Literacy / Media Education / Digital Citizenship topics;
- Alignment with MIL for ASEAN Network's mission.

*Apart from these criteria, we tried to maximize diversity in gender, country of origin, rural/urban background, age, and professional background (e.g., for-profit, non-profit, government experience).



Minimal Technical Requirements

Participants are encouraged to join the program virtually using a desktop or laptop computer, as the digital platform works best with computers rather than handheld devices. 

Overview of Media and Information Literacy from Theory to Practice

This session will provide an overview of media and information literacy (MIL) concepts that may be foreign to some ASEAN participants. Aside from defining MIL, this session will urge participants to recognize the importance of media embeddedness and that MIL is a critical skill that must be taught in all aspects of daily life. For participants just starting with MIL, a better grasp of misinformation, disinformation, and malinformation is essential. Participants will also learn how to use MIL skills to take advantage of the media and information in their life and make decisions to change their community one student at a time. This session will help introduce the concepts that the presenters will cover throughout the three-day training course.



Building Resilience through Media and Information Literacy in ASEAN

This session will present an overview of ASEAN's MIL landscape, plagued by the *infodemic* or spread of internet rumors, misinformation, and disinformation. Studies show that citizens from Southeast Asia lack the skills to interpret the information they encounter through media. UNESCO identified media literacy as a key to fostering critical thinking, respect for cultural diversity, and open dialogue in the Asia Pacific region. But they also observed that one of the biggest hurdles to properly implementing media literacy education at scale was the lack of training for educators (ASEAN Foundation, 2022). Hence, this topic aims to provide participants with some updates on regional initiatives to strengthen the MIL competencies of teachers and teacher educators. What are concrete steps taken policy-wise to raise the MIL competencies of ASEAN citizens and transform them into agents of change that can counter media misinformation and disinformation?

Strategies to Counter False Information in a Modern Classroom

Since 2020, governments worldwide have had to establish limits on physical meetings to curb the spread of COVID-19. Fast forward to today, the education sector strived to shift from face-to-face classroom interactions to remote learning modalities. Under the "new normal," how would secondary school instructors and educators counteract the spread of false information and prevent students from becoming victims of fake news? What are the emerging roles of school heads, principals, secondary school instructors, and teacher educators in the digital classroom? What strategies can they use to meaningfully engage students in critically evaluating a piece of information they will encounter inside and outside the school?

Developing Student Digital Detectives in a Post-Truth Era


People can believe whatever they choose if they think it is correct. Post-truth became an international word in 2016, which relates to situations in which objective facts are less significant in moulding public opinion than appeals to emotion and personal belief. Without bordering on cynicism and distrust, how can teachers and educators use simple fact-checking techniques to counteract misinformation and disinformation? This session may focus on strategies for discerning facts from fiction, lateral reading, and finding online fact-checking tools.

Teachers' and Educators' Guide to Internet Safety

Teachers' and educators' internet safety approaches in the classroom have evolved as technology and our use of it has. In the past, digital citizenship lessons on internet safety focused more on dos and don'ts, such as creating secure passwords and avoiding talking to strangers online. While secure passwords are crucial for all technology users, teachers should never underestimate the dangers students might encounter inside or outside the classroom, because most internet safety concerns are much more nuanced. This session will look at how teachers can assist students in developing the critical-thinking skills and mental habits necessary to navigate common online safety dilemmas – keeping online gaming experiences fun and healthy, and the benefits and risks of online-only friendships.

Teachers' and Educators' Guide to Protecting Personal Information and Privacy Online

How do we keep our students' data safe, private, and protected while harnessing the benefits of remote education? This session will examine identity threats to student privacy and their right to personal data on the web, steps students can take to protect themselves, and future strategies. In the age of manufactured consent, exploring digital footprint awareness and approach will help teachers understand how to empower students to choose and control what they leave online for others to find.





Detecting Deepfake: How to Counteract Misinformation/ Disinformation Created by Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Deepfakes involve video manipulations in which a face is swapped with someone else's using neural networks. Detecting whether a video has been manipulated differs from determining whether it contains false information. Deepfakes are a public concern, so developing methods to catch them is critical. Besides potential misuse, these tools can be used to defame someone. This session will provide an in-depth understanding of how far misinformation and disinformation could go and suggest strategies for teachers to detect a seemingly perfect deep-fake video, so they won't fall into the trap of sharing manipulated content.

SPEAKERS' PROFILE



Honorary Speaker



AMBASSADOR BRIAN D. MCFEETERS

His Excellency has served as U.S. Ambassador to Malaysia since February 26, 2021. A career member of the Senior Foreign Service, Ambassador McFeeters previously served as Deputy Chief of Mission of the U.S. Embassy, Baghdad, Iraq, Senior Advisor in the Office of the Counselor to the Secretary of State, and Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary in the State Department's Bureau of Economic and Business Affairs in Washington. He spent half of his 30-year Foreign Service career focused on the Southeast Asia region, including as Deputy Chief of Mission of U.S. Mission Indonesia, as Political Counselor at U.S. Embassy Kuala Lumpur, and as Deputy Director of the State Department's Office of Maritime Southeast Asia Affairs.

Ambassador McFeeters' other assignments include service as the Economic Minister Counselor of the U.S. Mission to the European Union in Brussels, Belgium, Economic Minister Counselor for U.S. Embassy Baghdad, and Deputy Political Counselor at the U.S. Embassy in Seoul, Republic of Korea. Ambassador McFeeters previously served in the U.S. Air Force, attaining the rank of Captain.

Ambassador McFeeters was awarded B.A. and B.S. degrees from the University of Notre Dame, an M.S. from the University of New Mexico, and an M.A. from the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies. His foreign languages include Malaysian, Indonesian, French, Spanish, and German.

MOHAMED DJELID

Mr. Djelid is the Director of the UNESCO Regional Science Bureau for Asia and the Pacific and Representative to Brunei Darussalam, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, and Timor-Leste.

Prior to his post in Jakarta, he served as Deputy Director of the Bureau of Strategic Planning (BSP) at Headquarters since October 2016. He provides intellectual, strategic, and operational leadership in the planning of the UNESCO Programme advancing the cause of poverty eradication, peace-building, and sustainable development. He also supports the coordination of resource mobilization.

In January 2013, Mr. Mohamed Djelid was appointed Director of the UNESCO Regional Office for Eastern Africa in Nairobi (Kenya). In this capacity he was responsible for the implementation of Education, Natural and Earth Sciences, Social and Human Sciences, Culture and Communication Information UNESCO programmes.

In July 2005, he was appointed UNESCO representative in Iraq where he supervised and supported the elaboration of the science and technology policy, the review of the national curriculum and launched the Educational TV "Iraqi Edu" Satellite Channel which provides quality education to Iraqi students.

DR. ROBERT CHAO, JR.

Dr. Chao is currently the Asst. Director/Head of Education, Youth, and Sports at the ASEAN Secretariat. Since 2013, he has been engaged in the international education development sector in various capacities in various organizations, including UNESCO, UNICEF, the European Commission, DAAD, and the British Council.

Dr. Chao has published in commissioned international reports, academic journals and edited volumes, and international media on regionalization and internationalization of higher education, teacher education, recognition of higher education, education and the 4th industrial revolution, and refugee education.

He has a Ph.D. in Asian and International Studies from the City University of Hong Kong, a European Master in Lifelong Learning: Policy and Management from a consortium composed of the Danish School of Education, Aarhus University, University of Deusto, and the Institute of Education, University of London, and a Master's in Education (Mathematics) from the University of the Philippines.

TESSA JOLLS

Ms. Jolls is the President and CEO of the Center for Media Literacy, a position she has held since 1999. She also founded the Consortium for Media Literacy, a non-profit that produces research and publishes a monthly newsletter.

During her tenure at CML, Ms. Jolls' primary focus is working in partnership to demonstrate how media literacy works through school and community-based implementation programs. She actively contributes to the development of the media literacy field internationally through her speaking, writing, and consulting, with curriculum development and research projects, and through publishing and disseminating new curricular and training materials.

Ms. Jolls was awarded the Fulbright NATO Security Studies Award in Brussels, as well as a Contributing Scientist position UCLouvain. She is a recipient of the UNESCO Global Information and Media Literacy Award for her service to the field.

DR. MASATO KAJIMOTO

Dr. Kajimoto an Associate Professor of Practice at the Journalism and Media Studies Centre, at the University of Hong Kong. Masato specializes in news literacy education and misinformation ecosystem research in Asia. In 2019 he founded ANNIE (Asian Network of News and Information Educators) to develop teaching and learning materials specific to the region with other likeminded experts in the field.

As part of the initiative, he is currently running a student-led fact-checking newsroom called Annie Lab (http://annielab.org) at the university. He is also the chief producer of the online course on Coursera titled Making Sense of the News: News Literacy Lessons for Digital Citizens (https://www.coursera.org/learn/news-literacy).

In the last few years, Dr. Masato has led a five-country UNESCO research and served as the chief editor for its publication titled "Media and Information Literacy Education in Asia: Exploration of Policies and Practices in Japan, Thailand, Indonesia, Malaysia, and the Philippines", written an entry on "News Literacy" in the Oxford Research Encyclopaedia of Communication, edited the paper "Information Disorder in Asia and the Pacific: Overview of Misinformation Ecosystem in Australia, India, Indonesia, Japan, the Philippines, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, and Vietnam."

DR. MARIA RITA D. LUCAS

Dr. Lucas is currently the Dean of the School of Education-Liberal Arts-Music-Social Work at Centro Escolar University. She is a practitioner and supporter of early childhood education, as well as a teacher educator. She has co-edited an international book on education policies and innovation published by ACEI Hong Kong-Macau and has written several textbooks for teacher education.

She served as an assistant secretary of the National Board of the Philippine Association for Teachers and Educators (PAFTE) from 2016 to 2019), and is currently Chairperson of the PAFTE-NCR Chapter.

Dr. Lucas holds a Ph.D. in educational management, an academically distinguished master's degree in psychology, and a master's degree in special education with a focus on early childhood teaching. She obtained a Certificate in Early Education Leadership from the Harvard University Graduate School of Education.

Inculcating the 5 national principles (Rukun Negara) and self-regulations and Malaysia ICT Volunteers (MIV), an empowerment program to help the communities increase their digital literacy skills, participate in the digital economy and embrace digitalization.

She is also responsible to strategize and work with various strategic partners from local and international organizations in the implementation of KDB and MIV programs with identified audiences and communities to increase digital literacy, develop digital champions, encourage digital inclusions, reduce the digital divide, and promote digital citizens in Malaysia.

Mr. Aribowo is one of the original founders of MAFINDO and is currently the organization's Head of the Fact Checker Committee. He leads fact-checking teams and manages MAFINDO's various media channels (including their social media accounts, the turnbackhoax.id website, which is the database of fact-checked results articles).

MAFINDO is a non-profit organization combating false information (or hoax as they are commonly called in Indonesia) by training and convening journalists, educating consumers of online media, and by building communities of online fact-checkers.

DR. JONALOU SJ. LABOR

Dr. Labor is an associate professor at the University of the Philippines-Diliman College of Mass Communication. He teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in communication research and theory. He holds a Ph.D. in Communication from the same university.

Dr. Labor has published book chapters with Routledge and the Ateneo de Manila Press; has edited two issues for Plaridel Journal; and has written chapters in an Anvil-awarded Communication Research primer. In addition, Dr. Labor has written at least 30 journal articles and conference papers since 2015.

Dr. Labor is part of the editorial boards of three communication, media, and society journals. He is the sitting Editor-in-Chief of the Philippines Communication Society (PCS) Review -- a national peer-reviewed journal for communication scholars and practitioners. In addition, he is the Managing Editor of the Plaridel Journal -- a Scopus, WOS, and ASEAN-indexed academic journal.

Dr. Labor has been a distinguished alumnus of the University of the Philippines Los Baños in 2021. He was also awarded as a University of the Philippines Scientist in the same year. He is the 2023 recipient of the Sheila Cunnison Prize for outstanding publication on gender and the global south by the top-tiered Journal of Gender Studies.




